## MATRIARCH MRS. ESTELLA W. BROWN



Wow! The honor of sharing this moment with my church family is huge. This is my mother, Estella W. Brown! She is now 92 years old and still as vibrant as ever! My siblings (Reggie, Richard and Reinette) celebrated her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday



together by zoom with extended family and friends. Even though our father, Rufus L. Brown, passed away November 3, 2017, he was certainly present as well! I was excit-

ed to commemorate my mom's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday by lovingly drafting a proclamation of her impressive life thus far. This proclamation was notarized by Reverend Kesha Wilson, member of Bethel A.M.E. Church Hampton. Mom was also presented with personal letters from the previous Newport News Mayor McKinley Price and Dr. George Price, III, previous superintendent of Newport News Public Schools. Mom taught in Newport News Publics Schools for over two decades and worked with Mayor McKinley Price for years to celebrate nonagenarians ~ over 90 year old people



Celebrating nonagenarians was heart work that mom enjoyed and was committed to doing with respect and pride. Newport News Active Lifestyles Program has celebrated ninety plus year olds for 17 years through the Lifelong Citizenship Awards Ceremony Program. This program honors Newport News Citizens "for their years of dedicated service and support to the citizens of Newport News. ## **ANCESTRY & NATIVE TRIBAL CONNECTION**

**THE TRIBE**: The Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) Indian Tribe has an intricate history. Excerpts from an article published by the *Virginia Department of Education* dated December 15, 2009, which was compiled by Chief Walter "Red Hawk" Brown, Tribal Historian, "the Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) Indian Tribe made first ethno-historic contact with the English in 1607-1608 in Nottoway County, Virginia. The English were looking for information connected to Roanoke Island the Lost Colony." "In the 17<sup>th</sup> Century, Virginia Indians (Natives) were divided into three language groups: Algonquian speakers, Siouan speakers, and Iroquoian speakers." The Iroquoian Tribes: Cheroenhaka (Nottoway), Meherrin, and Tuscarora occupied land east of the Fall Line on the inner Costal Plains of Southeastern Virginia. According to diary entries of James Edward Bland (expeditioner), the Nottoway Indians were called by Algonquian speakers as NA-DA-WA, which the Colonials reverted to



Nottoway. The true name of the tribe is Cheroenhaka, meaning "People at the Fork of the Stream." The lodging area was where the Nottoway River fork with the Blackwater River to form the Chowan River.

**BROWN/THOMAS SISTERS' LEGACY**: With the passing of Marie Brown in 2022, the last matriarch of the Brown siblings, only a

handful of cousins remain that can corroborate the tales of Grandpa Willie and Grandma Emma Jane. Aunt Marie was once asked if her father ever talked with her about his Native background. Her response was "No" and that her father would never speak on the topic. When asked why, she said that she did not know. In the 1800s, Native American cultures were primarily threatened and they feared the White settlers. The forced removal from their ancestral lands through government policies like the Indian Removal Act, resulted in the loss of their traditional way of life, sacred sites, and cultural identity due to displacement and assimilation efforts, often accompanied by violence and broken treaties. So, self-identifying as Native was not a safe thing to do.

#### ANCESTRY & TRIBAL CONNECION CONTINUED

NATIVE TRIBAL CONNECTION: For years, my siblings and I questioned our mother's ancestral lineage. However, it was a challenge finding anyone who knew enough about the Brown family's Native origin. As children we could see facial features in our grandpa that we considered Native (red undertone skin and wavy hair). Two of our uncles and three aunts also showed similar features. We had learned that one of our cousins, Walter Brown was a Tribal Chief. After attending a Brown Family Reunion in 1996, a few cousins and I decided to look into what it would take to become a member of the Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) Indian Tribe. It was said that there were other Brown cousins also considering joining the Tribe. So, after doing a little research, three of my siblings (Annie, Jean Kelly, Ruby Taylor) and I decided to join the Tribe as a memorial to our mother, Eunice Brown Thomas who died at age 47. We submitted the Tribal Membership Application, a Genealogy Lineage Sheet, and paid the administrative fee, and our applications were accepted. The membership was contingent upon providing a genealogy trail (Native American ancestry) back to the 1800s that could be verified by the US Census and/or 1808 Special Nottoway Indian Census in any of the Virginia counties: Southampton, Isle of Wight, Sussex, Greenville, Brunswick, Surry, Nottoway, to include Northampton and Gates County North Carolina. We were told that **Beadie Artis Brown** was considered the connecting source of our family. We were able to trace our Native lineage through our mother, Eunice Brown Thomas, her father, Willie H. Brown, his father, Junious Brown, then to his mother, Beadie Brown Artis.

**TRIBAL COMMITTMENT:** Being part of our Tribe requires commitment to maintaining our village/land and raising funds to accomplish tribal goals. As tribal members, we support both the Chief and the tribe when we host annual Powwows in the months of July and November; take part in Native American Presentations (schools, military installations, and libraries); offer tours to our Native Palisade Fort; School Days presentations; Native American Revival Crusades; sell of calendars, T-shirts, and Journals. While wearing Native regalia, examples of some of our duties: dancing into the opening of powwows and School Day presentations; demonstrating Native living skills in the Palisade 17<sup>th</sup> Century replica Iroquoian village; serving various Native food items from our kitchen during powwows; cleaning the village; and attending meetings. Tribal members participate during the year and on other special occasions: Juneteenth Celebrations; Indigenous People Month (October), Heritage Days hosted by local cities (Suffolk, Franklin, Hampton); Cultural Honors and Recognition to the Indigenous People (Richmond, Virginia); and Fort Monroe: Old Point Comfort Virginia Commemorations and the 1619 Commemoration First African Landing Celebrations.



\*I thoroughly enjoyed attending this commemoration and sharing this historical family moment with the NA-DA-WA ~ Nottaway Tribe. Being with our Bethelites, Sister Annie Thomas and Sister Patricia Redwood, allowed me to engage with them on a very personal level. Jessica Larché, a regional Emmy® award-winning Channel 3 evening news anchor, and investigative reporter as well as Congressman Bobby Scott, representative of Virginia's third congressional district in the U.S. House of Representatives, actively attended. Their presence and interaction reveals that history is important to them as well.

Currently, one long-standing goal of the Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) Indian Tribe is to become federally recognized. To be federally recognized will mean that tribal members would receive educational funds and other funding too. These funds will be used in the building of a cultural center and other projects.

CONTINUING THE LEGACY\*HONORING THE HERITAGE: My sister Annie "Songbird" Thomas and I have been members since 2010. Our oldest Sister Ruby, age 84 and the late Jean Kelly were also members. As with any organization, it requires commitment. We are also attempting to learn the Iroquoian language, customs, and Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) Indian Tribe history. We are committed to keeping our mother's memory alive as well as to represent our grandfather Willie Brown who was cheated out of his heritage.

~~~ Diasporas ~ people who have spread or been dispersed from their homeland

As Garvey's message spread, he created the physical manifestation of his message: The Black Star Line, a steamship company operated by Garvey and the UNIA to promote worldwide commerce among the African <u>diasporas</u>.

~~~ Subjugated ~ bring under domination or control, especially by conquest

However, the racial attitudes of the time **<u>subjugated</u>** African Americans to the lowest-paying, least stable jobs.


**~~~ Demagogues ~** a political leader who seeks support by appealing to the desires and prejudices of ordinary people rather than by using rational argument:

~~~ *Blatherskites* ~ a person who talks at great length without making much sense.foolish talk; nonsense

In an editorial, the *Newport News Star* newspaper criticized the Garvey movement by saying, "When people get to the point where they cannot tolerate honest difference, they ought to be suppressed. A great deal of the trouble the Negro is having in this country is brought on by such irresponsible <u>dema-gogues</u> and <u>blatherskites</u> as Marcus Garvey has gathered together in his schemes to filch money from the pockets of his unsophisticated followers and sympathizers, and anyone who dares differ or oppose their schemes is roundly cursed and marked."<sup>9</sup>

#### ~~~ Repatriation ~ the return of someone to their own country

Because of the failure of the <u>repatriation</u> bills, the start of the New Deal, Garvey's deportation, and subsequent death in London in 1940, and the onset of World War II, membership dropped in Newport News and the UNIA overall. Soon the wide-spread appeal of the UNIA ceased to exist.<sup>18</sup>


